Dear Friends.

I wonder if, like me, you were glued to the VE day celebrations and in particular to the memories of veterans and those who lived through both the war and the peace celebrations at home. Some were heartrending, others surprising, some ridiculous, all were touching, real people caught up in extraordinary circumstances. I was going to say 'ordinary people' but I don't believe there are any ordinary people. I've conducted several funerals lately and it is always a surprise to hear about the lives of seemingly 'ordinary' people, quiet, unassuming, self- effacing people, each one unique and precious.

Changing the subject, when I was a student, I lived and studied for a while in a small town near Nürnburg in Bavaria. I spoke quite fluent German but they have a strong accent down there – a bit like Glaswegians sound to us southerners, or probably as we do to them. One of the poets whose work we studied was Rainer Maria Rilke (1875–1926). His work is beautiful, strange and very difficult to translate!

However, not having thought about him for decades, I recently read a piece by Rilke, – translated by someone cleverer than I am! Rilke wasn't a convinced believer and struggled all his life with doubts and questions about life, death and everything in between.

The following passage struck me as being relevant to all of us, whether or not we are believers. I'm sharing it with you, in the hope that it will encourage you to continue asking questions, even if you have not yet received answers which you find satisfactory.

Believers have questions, our faith isn't blind, but we do trust God even though there are things we don't understand.

After all, if indeed he is the creator of everything it is hardly surprising that we can't grasp everything about him with our limited intelligence and experience.

#### He wrote:

'Have patience with everything unresolved in your heart, And try to love the questions themselves As if they were locked rooms

Or books written in a very foreign language.

Do not search for the answers, which could not be given to you now,

Because you would not be able to live them.

And the point is to live everything.

Live the questions now.

Perhaps then, someday far in the future,

you will gradually,

without even noticing it, live your way into the answer.'

I have noticed that as I get older, some questions I once had aren't so important anymore, some I have learned to live with and leave in the hands of our faithful, loving God. Perhaps I have learned to 'live my way into the answer.'

But there are still those questions, particularly about suffering, to which I have no answers, and which make me want to weep. I can't truthfully say I 'love' such questions, but I have learned not to waste my time and energy searching 'for the answers, which could not be given'.

# Astwood Hardmead

Well, despite Donald Trumps' refusal to acknowledge there is Climate change...... There is! With temperatures at summer levels during the day, plummeting to nearly freezing at night and no sign of rain, farmers and gardeners are struggling.

VE Day was celebrated with a happy gathering of Villagers outside the Pub, only the weather was chilly.

The Astwood Plant Sale was postponed because no one's plants had grown well enough to sell! The NEW DATE for the Plant Stall is 8th June, Coffee and Cake will be available as usual in the Village Hall.

A new venture in Astwood instigated by the North Crawley Estate is a Farmer's Market. This will be operating on the green opposite the Village Hall beside the Pub every second Sunday of the Month through to December from 10am – 2pm, offering a wide variety of artisan goods

Parking will be provided at the Manor Farm Business Centre.

This initiative could provide numerous benefits, including access to fresh, locally sourced produce, support for local and small businesses and a vibrant social hub for our neighbourhood.

Hopefully this will be a successful project but any support would be appreciated in promoting the market to the community through social media and telling friends and family.

Initially the Village Team are helping but going forward some more volunteers to help with the setup and management of the market would be brilliant.

Come along and support Astwood's Farmer's Market on Sunday June 8th from 10-2.00 and enjoy Coffee/Tea and Cake as usual in the Village Hall from 10.30-12.00

Speeding through Astwood continues. With our new SID (Speed Indicator Device) installed on the Cranfield Road facing South, traffic travelling in and out of Astwood was monitored. Between 20th March

and 9th May a staggering 72500 vehicles were recorded travelling through our village. Of these 51% were speeding, 31 cars were recorded travelling up to 80mph, 26 travelling up to 90 mph and 5 were travelling up to 100mph. There are some idiots around I'm afraid.

The Community Speedwatch Team has been in action to back up the SID and during 15 sessions of 30 minutes each 72 vehicles were recorded as speeding. The highest recorded speed was 62mph. All recordings are shared with Thames Valley Police and depending on the severity of the speeding (and if caught more than once) either a letter is sent politely letting the driver know that he has been recorded so "don't do it again" or a policeman arrives on the driver's doorstep and can award points, fines or even notice of pending prosecution..... so beware!

It's lovely to have the Pub open and have that centre of the Community available for gatherings again. See you there!

# Chicheley

We have arrived at the month with the longest day of the year and the one that introduces the start of the meteorological summer. With the very warm and pleasant days we have been enjoying recently it does seem as though summer is already here, but it has also introduced what to me is a bit of a puzzle. I commented in an earlier edition that last year supplied the heaviest fall of rain in a 50-year period but now after just 2 months of very low rainfall there is already talk of a possible drought and limitations placed on water supply.

If this is correct, perhaps not now but in future years and with all of the massive building projects that will be constructed in our area including SCAN Parish this will be a serious challenge for all of the authorities to deal with; it would be interesting to find out how they will deal with that. Now perhaps you would like to read about what has been happening in Chicheley recently and some plans for the near future so here goes.

#### V.E. Day plus 80 - 8th May 2025

Flags and bunting decorated the village hall inside and out; from 2pm onwards the village hall was open for visitors to view the exhibition of World War II memorabilia which included my display of the Battle of Britain Memorial Flight and a scene from The Dambusters.



Gordon Sparshott had a large collection of military artefacts, books and newspaper articles. (Gordon was the only person present who was able to recall his own experiences of V.E. Day 1945 when, as a school boy living in London, he was part of the crowd outside Buckingham Palace watching the royal family appear on the balcony.)

Chris Errington had a selection of books related to local villages near Stony Stratford and Wicken. Also he was guardian of an army tunic worn by Robert Ruck-Keene's father who served in the Oxfordshire and Buckinghamshire Light Infantry.

Christine Girard displayed items from her father's time in The Royal Navy – he served in the Arctic Convoys. David Blamires showed some items of his father's time in the R.A.F. Felicity Robertson displayed some R.A.F. memorabilia from her father's time when he served as a mid upper gunner in a Lancaster – also on display was a compass from a Lancaster

"The NAAFI" served a varied selection of food from that time. Thelma made corned beef sandwiches, I supplied a loaf of bread and a tin of Spam which she soon turned into excellent sandwiches. Sarah made some bread loaves which were sliced, buttered and topped with jam. Christine made delicious jam tarts and also supplied the home made jam whilst Felicity also made some bread, sticky buns and a delicious bread pudding.

Gordon's wife, Bobby, made a beautiful cake and cup cakes all decorated with VE 80 and union jacks.

Thank-you, ladies – it must have been good because very little was left.

In the evening a goodly crowd gathered for the lighting of the peace lanterns and Cris Tarrant's readings of Winston Churchill's and King George VI's speeches. Many thanks to the bellringers who walked over from North Crawley to ring the bells of St. Lawrence's Church. Although the event was free, donations were invited in support of SSAFA, the armed services charity for which £120 was raised.

Thank-you everyone who helped and supported to make this a very memorable day.

# North Crawley

#### Bulletin - May 2025

Hi Folks, Steve here with an update on all things Parish Council.

In May we have two important events at the Parish Council meeting – firstly our **Annual Parish Meeting (APM)** – this is an opportunity for our residents to discuss issues of importance to them with the Parish Council so we can include them in future discussions. Unfortunately, we didn't manage to attract a single resident (or a married one either!!). Hopefully it's because everyone is tickety boo with all that the PC gets up to and that we're not missing anything.

Please try to have a look at the summary of Parish Council activities over the last 12 months (on the PC website and on Facebook) which we prepared for the APM. Almost all of these activities would not take place if we had no Parish Council - and to keep our PC going we need volunteers to join us as our Councillors of the future. Please come and join us - we have an immediate vacancy - to keep our village thriving.

The other important event in May is the **appointment of the Chair** for the year ahead. As many of you know I will be leaving the village at some stage and felt it was only right to encourage another Councillor to take on the role whilst I can help hand over the reigns so to speak. I'm delighted to confirm that ClIr Derek Harpur has been elected the new Chair of the PC. I will be Vice Chair until I leave North Crawley. Derek does a huge amount of work behind the scenes both at the Ford, keeping it looking a beautiful place to walk through, and on various committees giving freely of his time to support our Parish. I'm sure you'll join me in wishing him every success.

At the moment there doesn't seem a great deal of support for the idea of a 20mph speed limit throughout the centre of the village. We only have 13% of the electorate in favour - and we need 50% to put in a successful bid for the change. We will monitor the responses closely over the next month before deciding how we progress (or not) from there. Separately the consultation by MKCC on converting our current 40mph section (from Brook End) to 30mph has now finished and we are waiting to hear the outcome.

We are hopeful we have found a candidate for the role of Village Warden but until that is confirmed we are keeping things ticking over between ourselves.

Now we have agreed the wording we will be putting new signage up on the Waste Ground (in front of The Church) to explain that, whilst it is not a car park, parking is permitted subject to a number of conditions (which will be listed). This will hopefully provide clarity for everyone.

This year's **Fun Day** will take place on **25th August** 12pm to 5pm and will be bigger and better than ever!! The free pony rides are returning, we have a much bigger bouncy castle for kiddies to enjoy and Gary will be rustling up his famous Hog Roast of course. More news later in the year but save the date now!! Still plenty of room for craft stalls - drop me an email if you'd like to be there! I will be organising the Fun Day this year but handing over to ClIr Laura Butterworth who will make sure this popular annual event continues to take place.

We are (hopefully) having the repair work to the surface carried out at the kiddies play park at the beginning of June. It will require the park to be closed off for a week as extensive new drainage is being installed to resolve the issue of muddy water seeping up. As soon as we know specific dates of the closure, we will post them on the play park.

Well, that's it for now and, as we head into Summer, isn't it wonderful to see the gardens bursting with new life and the trees and hedgerows full of birds and birdsong throughout our beautiful Parish.

North Crawley Institute management committee would like to remind drivers that the parking adjacent to the hall and shop is private parking for the users of the hall and its grounds.

It is not a public car park, and we are trying to avoid having to use a car park management company to ensure that it is available to legitimate users of our facilities but if unauthorised parking persists this is an option we may have to explore.






